He hopes that his personal experiences will lend insight into the documents and materials he reads, as well as lend to his ability to relate to family members hoping for more information. He will be putting most of his focus into the CBI Theater.

Presented by Dr. Jeff McGovern.

Jeff is a WWII Troop Carrier Historian: Specializing in the 435th Troop Carrier Group and Joint Troop Carrier and Airborne troops. Dr. Jeff McGovern is a member of the Leon B. Spencer Research Team and historian who has had the good fortune to be employed over the last decade as a US Air Force historian and as battle staff ride historian.



The accompanying photo was taken on Landing Zone N during a staff ride for Operation MARKET GARDEN.



He is currently serving as the USAF's Twelfth Air Force (Air Forces Southern) Historian. Jeff also was a battle staff ride historian.

Staff rides are classrooms in the field; you can't beat being "in place" when communicating lessons learned from history.

One of his particular foci is on the World War II history of 435th Troop Carrier

Group. This was driven in part because he had the privilege and honor to serve for five years as the USAF historian for the European and African based 435th's modern iterations, the 435th Air Ground Operations Wing and 435th Air Expeditionary Wing.

His approach to Troop Carrier history is from a joint air and ground perspective.

Capt. Bill CHEOLAS, (USAF ret.)

During WWII he was assigned to the 72 Troop Carrier Sqd / 434 TC Group as a C-47 power pilot. A couple days before the Rhine Crossing operation

(he was training paratrooper drops), he was sent to the 86 TC Sqd /437 TC Group to fly as a copilot in a CG-4A glider in the VARSITY operation. For years Bill has been a guest speaker at various schools, educating the children about WWII and particularly Troop Carrier and glider operations.





Ist Lieutenant Fred H. LUNDE, turned 100 on September 8th, 2022. He has for years been an avid ballroom dancer. He is rich in family and life. During WWII he was assigned to the 49th Troop Carrier Sqd. / 313th TC Group where he flew a CG -4A glider behind enemy lines in the Holland operation codenamed MARKET GARDEN. He was unexpectedly put on the line with the 82nd Airborne by General Gavin for three nights. Then upon evacuation his convoy was attacked.

Major Frank TAFLEWITZ BRANDON,

(USAF ret) was born on March 5, 1920. During the war he was assigned to the 97th Troop Carrier Sqd. / 440th TC Group. He flew a glider behind enemy lines in the Holland operation.



Eighteen gliders in serial 23 Sept. were released at the wrong LZ., six of these pilots are lost in action; Lt.

Hester E BARFIELD Jr., F/O Roy BAILEY, F/O Frank **TAFLEWITZ**, F/O John J KIRLIN, F/O Eugene H MEYER, and F/O Robert A PALMER. Efforts to locate them thru the 1st Airborne Army have been unsuccessful.

2nd Lt. BARFIELD and F/Os BAILEY, KIRLIN, MEYER, PALMER and **TAFLEWITZ** are now being carried on the rolls as MIA, as of 7 October 1944.

Claudia Stickney Coggin is the daughter of Lt Franklin Stickney who served as a member of the 87th Troop Carrier Squadron / 438th TC Group, as a combat glider pilot in WWII. As with many veterans, her father rarely spoke about his service in the US Air Corps as a glider pilot.

Only his grandson was smart enough to ask him questions. Thanks to a letter from Hans den Brok, she began her current journey to learn about her dad's service. Fortunately, Hans' letter came in 2012 just as she was retiring as an Assistant Professor at the University of North Texas School of Public Health. As a PhD, she was skilled in scientific research in public health topics, but she has experienced a steep learning curve to learn about historical military research which has been made easier with the assistance of the WWIIGPC Research Team.

Claudia does her research from her home in Fort Worth, TX where she also serves as the secretary for the WWIIGPC and serves as a Silent Wings member of the Museum Foundation. Between other volunteer activities, she enjoys her three children and their families.

Dr. Houck has been active in the care of refugees. Following medical school the University Washington medicine residency at the F/O Verbon "Pete" E. Houck University of Colorado, he worked in India and Nepal.

He served 28 years in the US Public Health Service. His assignments included the Indian Health Service as a clinician on the Navajo Indian Reservation; the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as Epidemic Intelligence Service

Officer, preventative medicine resident, public health educator, and officer with the Division of Global Migration and Quarantine; and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services,

where he performed healthcare improvement studies. He has worked with Haitian refugees at the Guantanamo Bav Naval Station; Chinese migrants off the Mexican coast: Middle Eastern refugees

the Greek island of Lesvos. on at the northern Greek border, and in France at the refugee camps at Calais; in Colombia with migrants from Venezuela; and in Guatemala with local populations. He is an aviation medical examiner for the Federal Aviation Administration and a consultant in public health for civil aviation. His research and teaching interests include refugee health.

Col. Mark "Plug" Vlahos retired from the United States Air Force in 2011. During his 29-year career, he served in a wide-range of operational flying and staff assignments including command of a C-130 squadron in

combat and Vice Wing Commander of the 314th Airlift Wing at Little Rock Air Force Base. He is a valued member of our Leon B. Spencer Research Team, a member "At Large" on the Executive Council and a regular contributor to our publication "The Briefing."

Friday Evening, Oct 7th continued- The Lubbock Women's Club

Mark's area of expertise and study is the 314th TC Group comprised of four squadrons (32nd, 50th, 61st, and 62nd) within the IX Troop Carrier Command, the 60th TC Group comprised of four squadrons (10th, 11th, 12th, and 28th) within the 12th Air Force and the history of North Africa, Sicily, Italy, Greece and Balkan Troop Carrier operations.

During his career, Mark flew with 3 of the 4 original 314th squadrons

and met many of the World War Veterans at squadron reunions. In 2019, he published a work entitled "Men Will Come" A History of the 314th Troop Carrier Group, 1945 1942 with Merriam Press.

Author of many historical articles, His first book-sized work <u>Winfield Scott's Vision</u> for the Army: <u>Mobilizing the North to Preserve the Union</u>, was self-published in 2015.

His next major publication entitled *Leading the Way to Victory a History of the 60th Troop Carrier Group 1940 - 1945* will be released in Dec. by Knox press.

Mark attended Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University and holds master's degrees from Webster University and the Eisenhower School for Strategic Studies, National Defense University.

His interests include tennis, U.S. Civil War, and World War II Army Air Forces history. He is a lifetime member of the Military Officers Association of America, The Air Force Historical Foundation, and the Troop Carrier/Tactical Airlift Association. He resides in New Braunfels, Texas.

Monique Taylor is the daughter of Lt Col Paul W. Mousseau who began his military career as a combat glider pilot in WWII. Like many veterans from that war her father did not speak in much detail about his time as a combat glider pilot, and it was only when

she was working on her Master's Thesis in History and settled on the topic of the CG4A Combat Glider and Pilot Program that Monique learned in detail of this fascinating aspect of WWII and her father's experiences. Since that Monique time taught history at the college level while accompanying husband, Robert **Taylor**

through his military career.

After Robert's retirement she returned to education earning her Juris Doctorate and at that time met Mark Vlahos via David Wilson. Dave's father was Paul Mousseau's tow pilot and saw him safely to his LZ's. Mark was at the time working on his book Men will Come, and a friendship based on a common interest was formed.

Monique currently lives in O'Neal's California with her husband on a 40-acre ranch. The flying gene her father had skipped her and she focuses instead on her lifelong love and passion - horses. Her son Jonathon Taylor, however, did inherit the gene and learned at his grandfather's knee about planes and flying. He is currently an Osprey pilot in the U.S. Marines Corps.

An election of officers will be held at the business meeting Saturday morning.



FACTS ABOUT THE DUTCH ORANGE LANYARD AWARD

The following facts were provided through the courtesy of Captain P. B. Grozen, USN, Defense Attache, United States Embassy, The Hague.

The Order of William (Militaire Willemsorde) is the highest award in the Netherlands. It is manifested by the Orange Lanyard (Oranje Koord).

In the year 1815, after the battle of Freedom had been fought against the French rulers (1813–1814), King William I of the Netherlands decided to initiate the Militaire Willemsorde to be conferred on those who had distinguished themselves for gallantry and loyalty in battle.

Our WWII combat glider pilots who participated in Operation Market-Garden, as part of the greatest airborne assault in the history of the world, indeed can be proud of having been honored as recipients of this award for the roles they played in the liberation of the Netherlands, in September, 1944.

For those GPs who did not return from those assault missions, let the rest of us stand tall on the parade ground of our minds, and let us hear "Silver Taps" echo through the halls of time. Their sacrifice of their lives merits the ultimate award for valor.

Susan is the grand-daughter of A. Francis Arcier who is referred to as the father of the CG-4A glider. Susan designs and crafts a full sized bed quilt every year for the last 13 years.
